# Today's Tip

Today, we conclude the series with my top tip!

#### Make it stick!

Make your message sticky with your audience, and sticky with Scripture."

# 1. Sticky with Scripture

If your message doesn't come *from* Scripture, it might stick for a moment—but it won't last. God's Word is what changes lives. So the first question to ask is:

Is this message deeply rooted in Scripture?

Not just a Bible verse here and there, but a message flowing from the truth of God's Word. Not a message salted with Scripture, but soaked in Scripture. Let Scripture drive the shape, the tone, and the heart of what you say.

# 2. Sticky with the Audience

But here's the other side. There's no point preaching truth if it doesn't land. If your hearers don't see what the truth means for them, it won't make a difference. That's why a second question is crucial:

Will this stick with my audience?

Use stories. Use images. Use questions. Be real. Be clear. Be honest. Jesus was a master at this—he told unforgettable stories that carried deep spiritual truth.

Take the parable of the prodigal son. It's a simple story—a rebellious son, a patient father, a bitter older brother. But it sticks, because it speaks to our hearts. We remember the hug, the robe, the party, the father running down the road. And then we realise: That's how God feels about me. That's truth that sticks.

# 3. A Final Reflection

So as you prepare your lessons, ask yourself:

Is this sticking with me?

If it's not real to you, it probably won't be real to them. Then ask:

How can I make it stick for them?

Not by watering it down—but by connecting the eternal truth of Scripture with the everyday lives of real people.

Sticky with Scripture. Sticky with your audience. That's your sweet spot.

# **Final Thoughts**

Thanks for watching this series. Whether you're just starting out or still finding your voice, remember this: you're not just delivering information—you're helping people encounter Jesus through the Word. So prepare well. Preach faithfully. And always ask—will this stick?
